Work experience students find out just what life is really like for an MP

HAVE a confession to make: I'm going to cheat a bit with this week's column. I've handed it over to the five work experience students who have joined me and my team in Westminster and Chelmsford over the last few weeks. I'm so pleased to have been able to give these students a taster of what frontline politics is all about and how an MP's office operates.

The students each had to complete various tasks during the few days they were with us. This included writing a summary - for a newspaper article - of what they thought of the experience and what they had learned. Here are some extracts from what they wrote.

Joanie Cheek, The Boswells School: At the beginning of the week, I was based in Westminster, where I was introduced to Marie's wonderful team and was kindly given the chance to tour Parliament and observe oral questions in the House of Commons. I also learned how Parliamentary questions are created in order to seek information, as well as hold government departments accountable.

Additionally, I assisted Marie's staff in creating social media posts, which taught me how MPs use their digital platform to engage with their constituents. I was particularly surprised by how fast-paced life in Westminster is, and impressed by how both the staff and Marie manage to handle everything.

I also developed a new appreciation for just how much thought and precision goes into an MP's work, ranging from speeches to social media posts.

Later on in the week, I completed the rest of my work experience in Chelmsford. Here, I was able to see the important behind-thescenes work done by the great manager and caseworkers to support the MP as well the residents Chelmsford.

I also visited the city council and listened in on some customer service calls, which showed me just how much time and care is taken to assist individuals. I then had the opportunity to attend the Skills Festival at Writtle College, where I saw how Marie encourages events that



benefit the community. For example, this event gave younger students the chance to explore different career paths and future education options. Overall, I learned that politics is hardly even about debates in Parliament. It is about constant communication, teamwork and intense dedication.

With three days in Westminster, I have completed many insightful tasks such as drafting: written questions, a press release and a briefing from oral questions in the chamber, and attending drop-ins. I learnt more about communications work, and everything that goes on behind

the scenes for MPs to be able to fulfil all their responsibilities. Shadowing work in Chelmsford City Council for the morning included listening to calls, and learning about how the staff support people who come in for help. Working in the constituency office portrayed the intricate work and time spent on all constituency casework.

I have been most surprised by how much time and effort goes into prioritising events in Marie's diary, and how her small team manage such a vast workload.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time on this placement, as I have gained a unique grasp on different jobs available in politics, and understood the immense dedication the staff in Marie Goldman's office put into helping constituents, whilst representing the Liberal Democrats in Westminster.

Later that afternoon, I presented Marie with a summary of what I learned from the oral questions session. This opportunity helped me to develop my advocacy skills, which I am certain will be valuable in the future.

Day three offered a different perspective, as I drafted a policy response to a constituent, an essential aspect of the work.

Overall, this experience has been invaluable, and I am truly grateful to have been part of such a dedicated team. I would wholeheartedly recommend this opportunity to anyone, regardless of their career ambitions. It is, without a doubt, a once-in-a-lifetime experience.
